The bulk of my career has been spent at Children's Mercy Hospital. In 1994, when two people left the section of General Pediatrics at the same time and because of my previous involvement with the section, I was offered a full-time job at CMH. Because of my love of teaching and my wish to get back to inpatient medicine, I made another career change. While at CMH, I attended on in-patient, out-patient and nursery rotations. I really tried to be the kind of attending who would do an H & P, a discharge, enter orders or do a dictation. The idea of teamwork was paramount when I was on service.

From 1994 through 2009 I attended on the General Pediatric in-patient service with medical students and residents for five or six 10-14 day rotations each year. My responsibilities as an attending included guiding family centered rounds while covering the topics of failure-to-thrive, ALTE, pneumonia, febrile seizures, meningitis, cellulitis, asthma, dehydration/rehydration, acute gastroenteritis/rotavirus and RSV bronchiolitis among many others. There were also always a few diagnostic dilemmas on the service. I tried to combine didactic teaching along with bedside clinical exam demonstration and education during rounds.

Newborn nursery coverage consisted of me attending in the nursery at Truman Medical Center, seeing 7-20 newborns each day with a team of medical students and residents. I covered the nursery for five or six 10 day rotations each year. The topics taught and routinely demonstrated (if applicable) included normal newborn care, exam of the newborn, hyper-bilirubinemia and entero-hepatic circulation, transitional circulation in the newborn, Down Syndrome, APGAR scoring and brachial plexus injury. With each new monthly rotation of residents we would demonstrate a Plasti-bel circumcision and then supervise them while they performed theirs. Ill babies were transferred to the intensive care nursery

My work in the general outpatient clinic included daily teaching in the clinical setting with medical students and residents. I also had dedicated time to see my own panel of patients, without residents or students.

I received an unsolicited call from this group in early 1991 offering me a position. After much deliberation I decided to change practices. This group offered a 1-in-6 call schedule and they did not attend C-sections as both hospitals at which we were on staff employed neonatal advanced practice nurses. We made nursery rounds at 2 hospitals and performed all of the circumcisions. I became familiar the Gomco method of circumcision but would still occasionally use the Plastibel. We initially cared for our own in-patients at St. Luke's however by the end of my time with this group, it had become more common to admit all patients needing hospitalization to Children's Mercy Hospital.

I started my primary care pediatrics career with this group and will be forever grateful for their patience and guidance. While with this group I was on the medical staff at three hospitals in Eastern Jackson County. My full time position with this group consisted of staffing two busy Pediatric primary care clinics, a very large clinic in Blue Springs and a smaller one in Independence. At the Independence office, I would often be the only care provider present on any given day, handling whatever walked in along with the scheduled patients. We admitted many children to our three community hospitals, referring those needing or headed towards needing an Intensive Care setting. It was a 1-in-5 call situation and we attended most C-sections at all three of our hospitals. I feel I became quiet proficient in the clinic, the delivery room and the Level 2 nursery. A typical day would consist of nursery rounds at one or two hospitals, inpatient rounds (if there were any inpatients) and a day in the office. In 1995, 4 years after I had left this group, I began working in their urgent care clinic and that experience is detailed below.
